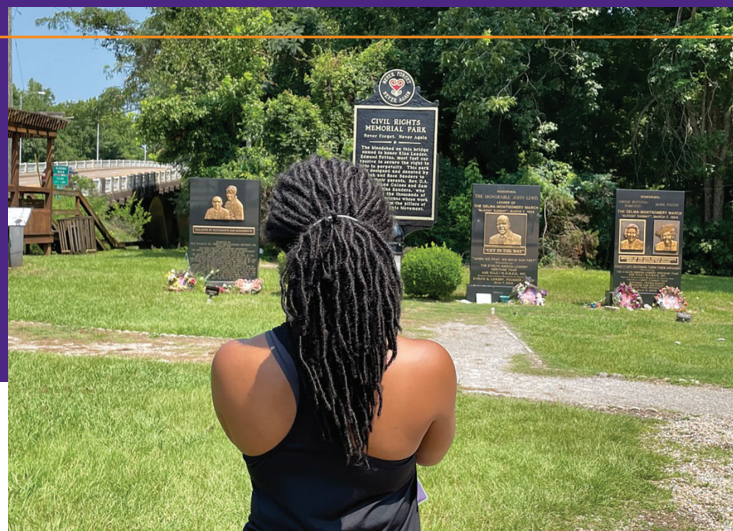


## 8-DAY BUS TOUR OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS SOUTH

### Explore the history of civil rights in the US

Join the University of Evansville on an 8-day bus trip to points of historical importance throughout southern US states to explore and experience the Journey to Justice.

Throughout the trip, you will have the chance to reflect on your experience, both individually and through listening and discussion with the students who join you on this journey.

- Work in teams in a Changemaker Challenge to develop a project proposal for positive change.
- Explore the intersection of food and the Black American experience through a variety of cultural food such as Memphis barbecue, soul food, and a traditional Ethiopian meal.
- Make lasting friendships with other young people who want to create a more just and equitable world.



### Earn College Credit

The Journey to Justice bus tour is an interactive experience and part of the Social Justice Movements ethics course. Upon completion of the tour and course requirements, students will have earned 3 college credits, applicable toward the ethics and social change major or a general education requirement.

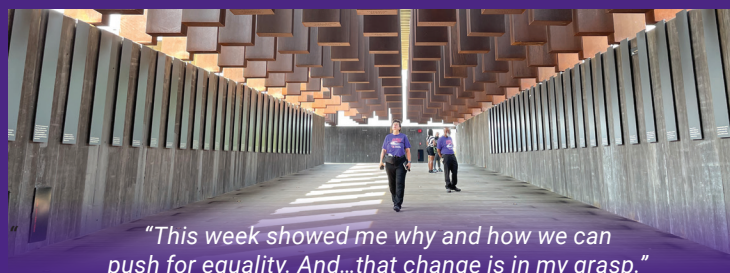
### Who Can Register
