WHAT IS A PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT (PA)? •____

Physician assistants are nationally certified and state-licensed healthcare professionals who provide direct patient care and work as part of a physician-led team in delivering a broad range of diagnostic, therapeutic, preventative, and health maintenance services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that the job outlook for physician assistants is very strong. Their estimate is for employment of physician assistants to grow 28 percent from 2021-2031, much faster than the average for all occupations. How do I become a physician assistant?

A physician assistant will have a four-year undergraduate degree, gain entry and complete a two-year master's program from an accredited institution such as the University of Evansville. At the University of Evansville, our Pre-PA students major in programs such as Biology, Chemistry, Biochemistry, Exercise Science, Neuroscience, Public Health, and Health Service Administration while completing the necessary prerequisite courses for application to PA school. During their time at UE, our students have incredible opportunities to work collaboratively on research projects and internships while also receiving valuable mentoring from UEPA faculty and students.
